Module 1 Discussion- Introduction and Main Themes of Democracy

Discussion Topic:

What would happen if we didn't have a government? What would our every day experiences be if we NEVER had any type of government?

Netiquette (Net Etiquette):

Netiquette or Net Etiquette refers to the acceptable standards of behavior when interacting in an online environment. There are a few simple rules:

Be Respectful of Others: It is important to be courteous and respectful of others time, bandwidth, and opinions; behave in a manner that is professional; never "say" anything online

that you wouldn't be willing to say to someone in person; remember that there are many different viewpoints, beliefs and ideas – embrace the variety, you may change your opinion ... understand that we may disagree as it is part of the learning experience ... if you do disagree, remember to challenge the idea and not the person; be open minded and listen to other's thoughts and ideas.

- **Privacy:** Posting private information in the wrong place can have serious consequences. Respect the privacy of classmates and what is shared in the course.
- **Appropriate Language and Communication:** Check your writing for errors before posting, either use a word processing program (such as Word) or use the spell check tool in the text boxes within the course. Use proper spelling and grammar. Refrain from using social media abbreviations (e.g. lol, omg, lmao, etc.) and any inappropriate or offensive words. Remember do not type in all capital letters – it is the same as yelling at someone and is considered rude. Be careful with the use of humor and sarcasm, both can be easily misunderstood without the benefit of seeing facial expressions and hearing inflection and tone of voice.
- **Just the Facts:** Respect other people's time by keeping messages, posts, and comments short and to-the-point. Support stated opinions with facts and reliable sources. Review all discussion posts before posting your own to avoid redundancy. Remember to be friendly, positive, and self-reflective when participating.

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Module 3, Lesson 3 Discussion: Political Parties

Discussion Topic:

It is easy to dismiss the two party system as being harmful. People point to a lack of precise representation, the idea that one of the two parties does not exactly represent their beliefs, as one of the main criticisms.

It is harder, but more interesting to look at the opposite point of view:

Why might a two party system be advantageous? Why might it be better than a multi-party system?
